They recently launched their latest publication, Beyond The Bookshelves. It is particularly special to us, as it reveals and celebrates some of the important collections held here in our library. They tell some intriguing stories about people of West Cornwall whose records are lodged in the Morrab Library archive. Included are a groundbreaking femále librarian, some rebellious Methodist ministers, Penzance's own Sir Humphry Davy - and his passion for angling, artists who designed bookplates and etched beautiful wood block prints, and even an autograph album with celebrity-drawn pigs! Copies are on sale at the library for £15, with a share of proceeds being generously donated to us by the PLHG, so you'll learn more about our extraordinary collections while supporting the care of them.







# OUR CHILDREN'S SHORT STORY COMPETITION

September saw the winners of our Children's Short Story Competition announced at a wonderful ceremony in the library (picture below). #### **NEWS ON OUR RESIDENCIES**

Our Writer-in-Residence, author and poet Peter McAllister, continues his time with us, currently leading a project with some of our members to create stories using records in our Archves collections - more soon!

It was a complete joy to host our most recent Artist-in-Residence, Claire Lucas in October, when she exhibited her work in the Elizabeth Treffry Room and delivered a talk about her time with us (pictures at left). #### KOHA -OUR NEW ONLINE CATALOGUE

At the end of August, the library launched our Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC), taking its first steps towards our book listings becoming fully digital - and of course we celebrated with cake! Over 12,000 of the library's book titles (around 20%) can now be searched online via our website. #### WHAT HAVE WE BEEN UP TO?

Quite a lot actually! The last few months have seen:

- Seven talks, on subjects including bellringing, Medieval church wall paintings, the Nicholson sisters, cathedrals, the history of Penzance, Frankenstein, and the story of the St Aubyn family, and more;
- Super 'Spooky' Storytime for our young members, enjoying the story and activities around Winnie the witch and Wilbur the cat's haunted house adventures;
- We've hosted classes on watercolor painting, creative writing, the world of Anglo-Saxon England, t-shirt printing, embroidery and bookbinding;
- We welcomed students from Helston Community College for a study morning, and members of both the Pendeen, and Perranuthnoe & Goldsithney Women's Institutes;
- We displayed a selection of some of the most rare and fragile books in our collections at our Rare Books Open Day;
- Our Christmas Fair saw us welcome a record 458 visitors and raised over £2,000. We are so grateful to
  the 29 volunteers who helped staff make it happen, and to you, our members, for your support by
  spending your money, making cakes for our refrehsments room, and bringing along your friends and family.
  A special thank to our stallholders, and the local businesses who donated such brilliant raffle prizes.



#### LOOKING FORWARD...

Our staff and volunteers will work hard to bring you a new year of Morrab Library reading and learning opportunities - and some fun! Look forward to more Fairs in Spring, Summer and Winter, new books in the collections based around your suggestions, classes and workshops on a plethora of subjects for every age, Open Days exhibiting our rare collections, and of course more regular talks. We already have some lined up in 2026, on subjects highlighting our Photo Archive collections, Cornish folk tales, poetry, Daphne du Maurier, and a doctor and lighthousekeeper's life in the 19<sup>th</sup> century on the Isles of Scilly. We'll also continue to catalogue our indexes to bring the guides to our collections into the light to share more widely with the world.

#### PHOTO ARCHIVES NEWS

It has been an interesting year in the Photo Archive. While we have been continuing to scan the remains of the collection and create records we have also started phase two of the project. From the early days of digitising the photographs we have also had in mind that many of the records needed refining and adding to. This has now started in earnest and we are tackling the way in which members and friends can find what they are looking for - expect new instructions on the website in the course of 2026.

There is an exciting exhibition of photos from the Serena Wadham collection being planned and we

will keep you informed on that.
This year, in time for Christmas, we have made the first of a planned series of booklets of photographs from the collection. Entitled 'Working Lives' it shows people in and around Penzance at work, resting from work or pausing to have their photos taken. The photos date from the 1880s to the 1950s and it is on sale now for £8. 'Working Lives' is dedicated to the memory of Glyn Richards -Seafarer, Local Historian, inspirational and much missed member of the photo archive team. David Puddifoot, Photo Archives Manager

#### BOOKING DESK SPACES

Regular library visitors will know that there has been increased pressure at times on the demand for desks by members at which to work and write. Please also remember that phone calls, ZOOM and in-person meetings are not permitted in the library spaces - it is too disruptive to your fellow members. We are grateful for your cooperation.

#### HONOURING OUR VOLUNTEERS

This year, the library has achieved a lot - we're heading for 900 members, we've digitally catalogued more than 2,400 books (out of more than 13,000 in total), added many hundreds of new titles to our collections, catalogued more archival records, cleaned and repaired many hundreds of books, and much more.

And of course, not one single bit of this could have happened without our volunteers - all 73 of them. They are valued and respected, and the library is extremely grateful to them. It would be impossible to name all the tasks they undertake here, but here are just a few:

- Conservation, cleaning and repair of the books;
- Cataloguing books;
- Front desk welcomes;
- Working in the Photo Archive;
- Archives cataloguing and digitisation;
- Trustees and their governance;
- Managing book sales; Running events;
- Checking for pests (of the insect kind!);
- Auditing the newspaper and journals collections;
- SO much washing up!;
- And much, much more.

So we want to acknowledge each and every volunteer and thank them for their work, their inspiration, their ideas and most of all, their brilliant company.
